## A Letter from Christine Bealer

Welcome to the month of July - the beginning of the second half of the year.

The Gregorian Calendar is the calendar used in most parts of the world; it came into effect in October 1582. July, the seventh month, is on average the warmest month in most of the Northern Hemisphere, where it is the second month of summer, and the coldest month in much of the Southern Hemisphere, where it is the second month of winter.



How did the name of July come into being?

After the murder of The Roman General and Statesman Julius Caesar on the Ides of March in 44BC, Rome was on the brink of civil war. Many within the Roman aristocracy wanted Caesar condemned as a tyrant who needed to be purged from history, while the Roman citizens admired and adored him. To stabilize the situation and prevent a civil war, the Roman Senate chose to side with the people. They gave Caesar's birth month Quintilis the new name 'mens iulius', 'the month of Julius'.

There are a number of religious holidays during the month of July; in date order here are some of them:

The Seventeenth of Tammuz is a Jewish fast day on July 5-6 commemorating the breach of the walls of Jerusalem before the destruction of the Second Temple. It falls on the 17th day of the 4th Hebrew month of Tammuz and marks the beginning of the three-week mourning period leading up to Tisha B'Av, the saddest day in the Jewish calendar. On this day, the Book of Lamentations, which mourns the destruction of Jerusalem, is read in the synagogue, followed by the recitation of kinnot, liturgical dirges that lament the loss of the Temples and Jerusalem.

Islamic New Year Al-Hijra & Muharram

As the Islamic New Year is determined by the lunar calendar, it does not always occur on the same date of the Gregorian calendar, but will vary each year. In 2024, AI-Hijra is set to begin on the evening of 7th of July.

Hijra in Arabic means 'migration' or 'emigration'. In Islam, the Hijra refers to the 200-mile journey Muhammad made from his hometown of Mecca to the city of Medina in order to escape religious persecution.

### July 21 – Asalha Puja

For Buddhists, this day is the start of a three-month mandatory retreat for all monks. Buddhists visit temples to give offerings, pray and meditate and listen to sermons. It is intended to be a day of new beginnings and renewal.

And finally, on 21st July, this year 2024, we will be having our own new beginnings and renewal in St Bartholomew's Church. A Thanksgiving service for the redecorated Church will be held in St Bartholomew's Church and we are pleased to announce that The Right Revd the Bishop of Colchester will be joining us for the 10.30am service. So all you lovely people from Wickham Bishops who have supported the church and helped to raise the monies needed the complete the decoration and refurbishment; we are so very grateful to each and every one of you and would be pleased if you would join us on that day, so we can welcome you to come and see the finished results for yourselves!

# From the Parish Council ...

A General Meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 4th of June. The minutes of the meeting can be read on:

The website has been upgraded and expanded recently. It now not only includes details of future meetings and council records, but also community pages which give contact details for social groups in the village, pages from the biodiversity and wildlife group, and a list of the current planning applications for Wickham Bishops and nearby parishes, where the proposal is close to our boundary. There is also a page of useful contact numbers and a link to the No. 90 bus timetable. Suggestions for additional features that could be included, are always welcomed.

In May, our 'Speedwatch' team recorded 100 vehicles exceeding the 30 mph speed limit, during 9 hours of checking, including one motorcycle clocked at 65 mph. The 'TruCam' team attended for four and a half hours during May and recorded 58 drivers exceeding the 30 mph speed limit. This is a service paid for by the Parish Council and any motorist caught exceeding the limit will be subject to the same penalties as if caught by the police.

The 'Saturday Surgery' is to be held on the 20th July and the 17th August, from 11 am to 12 noon, in the Library. No appointment is needed and all residents are invited to come and discuss any matter of concern.

A General Meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 2nd July at 7:30 pm in the boardroom of the village hall. Residents are invited to attend and may speak on any agenda item, or other matter of concern, during the 'Public Forum'. There is no meeting scheduled for August. ### "Managed Migration" to Universal Credit

Many people who currently receive a means-tested "legacy benefit" such as Working Tax Credits, Income Support or Employment Support Allowance will need to claim Universal Credit instead through a process called "managed migration".

#### How do you know if you need to do anything?

You will get a letter from the DWP and, **if it has a deadline** to claim Universal Credit (which should be at least 3 months in the future), this is a Migration Notice. On the deadline date your old legacy benefits will stop so it is really important not to ignore the letter. **The DWP won't automatically transfer you onto Universal Credit – you need to make the claim yourself.** 

If you claim Universal Credit before the deadline, the DWP might pay you extra to stop you being worse off. This is called 'transitional protection'.

This means that if you would get less on Universal Credit than your old benefits, you will get an extra amount to make up the difference. The DWP will reduce this extra amount over time - so you will eventually just get what you normally would on Universal Credit.

Transitional protection also means you might be able to get Universal Credit when you wouldn't usually be entitled to it. If you:

- are a full-time student who wouldn't usually get Universal Credit, you can usually get it until the end of your course
- get tax credits and have over £16,000 in savings or investments, you can get Universal Credit for up to a year this is a type of transitional protection called a 'transitional capital disregard'.

#### If you can't claim by the migration deadline

If the deadline hasn't passed yet, you can ask the DWP to extend it. You can only ask for this before the original deadline in the letter. If the DWP agree, they'll send you a new deadline.

If the deadline has passed, you can still get transitional protection if you claim Universal Credit up to a month after the deadline. The end of the month is called the 'final deadline'.

If you claim after the final deadline, you can still claim Universal Credit - but you can't get the transitional protection.

#### Timing of your claim - tactics

If there is time before the deadline, it is important to make sure you are getting all the legacy benefits to which you are entitled as this will maximise any transitional protection.

#### **Claiming Universal Credit**

If you claim Universal Credit, you usually get one payment each month and you usually have to manage your claim online.

It will usually take 5 weeks to get your first Universal Credit payment, but it could take longer.

Your old benefits might stop before your Universal Credit starts. When they stop depends on which benefits you get, and when you claim Universal Credit.

If you claim before the deadline from the DWP:

- tax credits stop the day before you claim Universal Credit
- Housing Benefit, income-based JSA, income-related ESA and Income Support stop 2 weeks after you claim Universal Credit

If you claim Universal Credit after the deadline from the DWP:

- tax credits stop the day before the deadline from the DWP
- Housing Benefit, income-based JSA, income-related ESA and Income Support stop 2 weeks after the deadline from the DWP

You will only get the extra 2 week payments if you're still eligible for the benefit. You won't need to pay back the extra payments and they won't affect how much Universal Credit you will get.

If you won't have enough money to live on while you wait for your first Universal Credit payment, you can ask for an advance payment. The advance payment is a loan which has to be paid back.

**Many people are better off on Universal Credit than the old legacy benefits** – it is worth checking what you might be entitled to as you can choose to change over earlier and not wait for managed migration.
